The Educational Foundation proudly announces the appointment of Carol Wagner to the Board of Directors. Fields of Dreams Honors Donors and Scholars

Fields of Dreams, the Educational Foundation's annual Scholarship Banquet, celebrated donors and scholars on September 28 at the Westin Chicago North Shore Hotel. Thanks to the generous contributions from businesses, organizations, and individuals, 444 students received scholarships totaling \$510,000.



"As public funding decreases, we must find alternate sources of financial aid to make higher educational accessible and affordable for all students," said Dr. Carlee Drummer, Educational Foundation executive director. "Last year we awarded 323 scholarships, totaling \$313,000. To offer 121 new scholarships and almost \$200,000 more in financial assistance says a great deal about the benevolence of our benefactors who play a vital role in helping our students succeed."

Donors also funded eight new scholarships for the 2010-2011 academic year, including:

Bob and Jane Debaun Scholarship

This scholarship, established by Mr. and Mrs. DeBaun, supports a full- or part-time student.

Fields Scholarship

Established by Larry and Marilyn Fields, the scholarship provides assistance for a full- or part-time student.

Dr. Kenny Jackson Williams Scholarship

Former Oakton Board of Trustee member Emory Williams created this scholarship in memory of Dr. Kenny Jackson Williams to support a full- or part-time minority student.

Shan Nandi Memorial Scholarships

Established by the IEEE/PES Insulated Conductors Committee to honor its late chairman, Shan Nandi, a former adjunct professor at Oakton, these scholarships assist engineering students with at least a 3.25 GPA.
