

Dear Colleagues,

Happy New Year! I hope you all had opportunities to rest and recharge over Winter Break and spend meaningful time with loved ones as you celebrated the holidays.

While 2022 is less than a month old, it has already presented numerous challenges. This week we kicked off the spring semester, and up until just a few days ago, I fully expected to restore in-person classes to pre-pandemic levels and welcome students and faculty back to our campuses. But as you know, rising COVID-19 cases increased the level of concern for many of our colleagues and students, and we quickly transitioned many courses online for the first two weeks of the semester.

To say we implemented this temporary transition on short notice would be an understatement. Faculty quickly modified their curriculum, and staff and administrators in Student Affairs, Academic Affairs, College Relations and IT sprung into action once again to work through the many adjustments needed to communicate with students and faculty to support the transition to remote teaching and learning. I know it wasn't easy, but you did it – and I thank you.

In fact, nothing during this pandemic has been easy. And I know not everyone agrees with this course of action. Still, we worked together and we'll move forward, supporting students and one another.

While we will continue to be responsive to pandemic-related changes, I fully expect courses will revert to their originally scheduled format starting Jan. 31. Students who registered for in-person learning did so because it is the learning modality that best suits their needs. For many students, the in-person connection they find in our classrooms — both with their peers and faculty — is a central component of their Oakton Experience and a catalyst for allowing them to reach their Big Goals.

We are absolutely committed to creating a safe environment for all, but ultimately, we must learn to live and work alongside COVID. We will continue to utilize mitigation strategies recommended by health officials, including masking, testing and increasing vaccination rates. I encourage you to take advantage of expanded COVID-19 testing hours on both campuses and on-campus vaccination clinics scheduled throughout the semester, which offer Pfizer and Johnson & Johnson boosters for those eligible. Even as we continue to navigate these seemingly never-ending challenges, I'm proud of all the great work taking place at the college, by individuals and as a collective. We're able to accomplish much of this work partly because of the grace and flexibility we continue to afford one another and our students. I know this mantra of "grace and flexibility" has been repeated so often (especially by me) that we risk losing sight of

what it really means. I make it a point to continually remind myself of its true meaning. I recently came across articles (which I've shared with some of you already) in the Chronicle of Higher Education and Korn Ferry (a management consulting firm) that provide helpful reminders of the importance of leading with grace — demonstrating empathy, courage, and genuine human connection with our colleagues and our students.

Thanks to everyone who attended the virtual Spring Kickoff presentation earlier this month. We heard powerful personal accounts from colleagues about their equity work – and its impact on our students. I hope that by hearing about these initiatives — including iANDALE!, COMPASS, The B.L.AC.K. Student Success Program, Elevating Indigenous Voices at Oakton (EIVO) and the forthcoming Oakton Academy for Black Men — you were inspired about opportunities for collaboration that will allow us to support students even further.
